From the Principal's desk

Congratulations to our fabulous P&C for running another highly successful Quiz Night. The school P&C, ably led by Lauren Kelly, did an outstanding job organising this special event, alongside a stalwart team of volunteers and school helpers. From all of us, a heartfelt 'THANK YOU' to everyone involved, including those in our school community who attended the event as well as those who supported the P&C with donations. This event raised over \$12,000.00, surpassing all expectations, and they still had the energy to run a Father's Day stall!

We were pleased to welcome Deputy Principal, Kylie Butler, to Carson Street earlier this term. Kylie will lead the areas of Positive Behaviour Support (PBS) and Disability Resourcing. With most of her career being in educating and supporting students living with disability, Kylie has a broad



range of experience, including the School for Special Education Needs: Disability and most recently as Principal of Riverton Education Support Centre.

With the arrival of a second deputy, our Positive Behaviour Support Coordinator, Janine Beattie, has taken a new leadership role and will oversee the strengthening of our school culture, with specific emphasis upon Aboriginal Cultural Standards, student and staff wellbeing, and student and staff engagement. A positive school culture creates a safe and inclusive learning environment for students, while attracting and retaining passionate, capable teachers.



We're very pleased to announce that the Department of Education has approved our request for two transportable classrooms, and we have been informed that they will be ready by the

first day of school, 2024. The school has experienced rapid growth in student numbers this year, especially in the early years and these new classrooms will allow us to offer more families a placement for their child.

The school's annual celebration of science, technology, engineering and mathematics, better known to us as Science Week, had something for everyone. The theme for National Science Week was 'Innovation: Powering Future Industries' and the STEM team comprising of teacher Connie Jakopo, and our guru for the Technology and Engineering branches of STEM, Tye Ranieri, organised a range of activities for our budding scientists which included robotics, launchers, drones, and sensory experiences. Students had plenty of opportunities to perform experiments alongside the wonders of making an ocean in a bottle. Who said learning wasn't fun!

Book Week began with the very special Grand Opening of our new Sensory Room. A sensory room is a controlled and intentionally created space that provides multi-sensory resources that support a student's sensory needs to enable to engage in learning. Program Coordinators, Andrea Rees and Sarah Rowe, created an immersive sensory experience using story books and the sensory elements of the new room. The school now has two multi-sensory stories, The Hungry Caterpillar and We're Going on a Bear Hunt, and we are thrilled with the results of these first attempts. A skilled sensory occupational therapist from Link Assistive, Sensory, was amazed with the results and expressed that she had never seen anything so precise and sophisticated done with the software! Sarah and Andrea don't do things by halves and are clearly high achievers!

We're pleased to let you know that the school's 'Getting Started' books and video resources are now on-line. These resources were designed and developed by behaviour specialist and speech pathologist, Dolly Bhargava, for the families of children living with disability. The original material has been updated and is freely available and on the school website. The resources cover a range of topics including the use of visual systems, promoting play, promoting communication for students with profound intellectual disability and promoting participation in everyday activities.

The spring break is only weeks away and I hope you're able to spend time sharing special moments with your family.




Blue Gum

Blue Gum students have had lots of fun engaging in activities that excite their senses. We've made sure to mix sensory activities into everything we do to keep



learning exciting. Whether it's making art, trying out cool STEM activities, enjoying stories, or playing outside,



we've got it all covered. The students get to touch, see, hear, smell, and experience new things in so many awesome ways.





REACH

Sensory play includes any activity that stimulates a child's senses of touch, smell, taste, sight and hearing, as well as anything which engages movement and balance.

In the REACH class, we have been practising our balance and coordination on fit balls and moving balls to follow lines to assist our crossing the midline.

Taking sensory breaks regularly, helps us to concentrate better when we get to doing our IEP tasks.

- It helps to build nerve connections in the brain;
- It encourages the development of motor skills, strength and coordination;
- It supports language development;
- It encourages 'scientific thinking' and problem solving.













Conductive Education

We are delighted to inform you that the Conductive Education Charity of Western Australia has very kindly agreed to fund a portable hoist which will allow all students living with a physical disability who require it, access to the wonderful new sensory room.

Thanks to the funds raised during our 'Move for CE' week in 2022 and additional funds from CECWA, we are now in the position to purchase two PETRA Frame Runner bikes! These will be a welcome addition to our playground activities.



Red Gum

In Red Gum sensory tasks and activities are part of our everyday learning. We like to test out our senses like smell, touch, taste and hearing.
